

Meet John Doe is a 1941 American comedy-drama film by Frank Capra, starring Gary Cooper and Barbara Stanwyck. The film is about a "grassroots" political campaign created unwittingly by a newspaper columnist with the involvement of a hired homeless man and pursued by the paper's wealthy owner. It became a boxoffice hit.

John Willoughby [is hired] to play the role of [the fictional] John Doe. Ann starts to pen a series of articles in Doe's name, elaborating on society's disregard for people in need
